INTRODUCTION

Thoever said that soccer was a man's game did not count on the march of women during the middle and late 1900's. The female of the species had turned their talents to many careers and sports dominated by men, and were now making headway in the last male stronghold – football.

Women contended they could adapt to soccer as well as they had to other sports. As they pointed out, soccer is a sport which demands skill and does not depend solely on brute force.

Some overseas countries did not approve of the female invasion – officials in Paraguay quite bluntly stated that there was a government order which forbad women to practise football because it would

often came to the fore in the face of increased Government funding or 'the women' staging a curtain-raiser to a feature men's game.

In Queensland there are newspaper records of a women's soccer match in 1925 and other articles regarding matches in the depression years of 1929–1932, but contemporary competition began about 1964.

In the ten years following 1964 women's soccer became firmly established in the Brisbane area largely due to the efforts of two stalwarts of that time – Bob Geoghegan (Annerley) and Keith Barclay (Coalstars) and eventually blossomed into an independent Association following the first National Championship in 1974.

Against such a background came the formation of separate Associations to cater specifically for women who wished to play soccer – first Nationally then Statewide.

Most Women's Associations met with passive acceptance along the lines of "at least we don't have to worry about them". However, male chauvenism

The enthusiasm and commitment of the officials of the past 25 years have carried the day against all the set-backs and disappointments to see women's soccer take its place in the Olympics – truly a magnificent achievement.

Women's soccer team scores silver

MANY fond memories of younger days on the soccer field were rekindled recently when the first women's team of the former Zillmere Stars Junior Soccer club got together for a 25th anniversary reunion.

What started out as a fun game turned into scrious competition for the ladies and they won their first three years of competition.

Fdna Hemming co-ordinated the establishment of what is believed to be the first ladies team in Queensland but ended up on crutches, unable to play during the inaugural

Six of the original 11 players made it to the reunion at North Star soccer club, 7illmere.

ADMINISTRATION

The bulk of early records of women's soccer in Queensland deal with the Brisbane competition with only peripheral mention of the Country Districts. Partly this is due to the original organisation being modelled on the Brisbane Junior Soccer Association and the Queensland Soccer Federation which were both Brisbane driven Associations, and partly because of the high turnover of officials in Country Districts which meant that early records were not preserved to the same extent as those in Brisbane.

It was on Sunday, 1st September 1974 during the first National Championship that a meeting was held to form an Australian Ladies Association, but as no-one had thought to mention the date or venue to QLD they did not attend.

The next night Dr Oscar Mate (WA) who had become the inaugural President of the fledgling AWSA by general consensus, apologised for this oversight and requested QLD's presence at a meeting to recapitulate the matters discussed and to seek endorsement of the decisions reached.

The main items as far as QLD was concerned were that the BJSA was offered the opportunity to stage the next Championship and that (as Secretary of the Association with the second longest established Ladies' Soccer Competition), it had been proposed that Frank Clarke be appointed Vice President of AWSA.



The BJSA later passed the following resolutions -

- 1. That Brisbane host the 1975 Championship
- 2. That as Frank Clarke had neither the wish nor the time to take on the AWSA Vice Presidency, Elaine Watson be appointed in his stead
- 3. That a sub-committee be formed from supporters of ladies soccer to administer and direct the Championship and supervise the 1975 season's fixtures.

After three years as AWSA Vice-President Elaine was elected President in 1977 on the nomination of NSW and WA – the only time that these States united on any action (particularly in support of Elaine) for many a year.

At the same meeting QLD submitted a Notice of Motion to the AWSA to guarantee North Queensland the right to affiliation when their Association was formed. QLD also submitted a draft AWSA Constitution which was later accepted with only minor amendments.

QLD has always had a strong presence on the Board of the AWSA, firstly through long-time President and Finance Director Elaine Watson and then through Dennis O'Brien who became President when Elaine stood down.

It became imperative that the 'Ladies' form their own Association in Queensland when it was projected that the boy's section of the Brisbane Junior Soccer Assn would have to split into North and South Divisions in 1976 because of the sheer volume of registrations.

As the number of women players would not support two viable competitions, it was decided that a subcommittee should be formed to conduct the fixture season whilst still under the umbrella of the BJSA and able to fall back on their experience. This Subcommittee was –

Meetings were held at the Watson residence where there was no curfew to restrict the lengthy discussions which took place and the supper provided by Arthur Watson maintained the energy levels of all. Insurance was one of the first concerns to come under the scrutiny of the Sub-Committee. Hartfield Monarch was the preferred carrier for the BJSA and under their policy benefits amounted to \$50 per week with a maximum of \$200 for medical expenses. The premium of \$167.50 per team was considered too expensive by member Clubs.

The next company approached was Equitable Life but again the quote was more than the trade would bear. Compulsory insurance had to wait until 1991 before being accepted. Insurance Exchange of Australia has given excellent service and the sponsorship rebates provide valuable funds.

The effect of the first Australian Championship in 1974 was felt in Brisbane the following year with an increase of clubs from eight to fourteen and teams from eight to sixteen.

On Wednesday, 17th September, 1975 a meeting was held at the Watson residence to have preliminary discussions on the formation of a Women's Association for the 1976 season. Several main issues as outlined below were considered and discussed.

 Whether the proposed Association should be termed "Brisbane Women's Soccer Association" or "Queensland Women's Soccer Association" and all the implications surrounding whatever choice was made.

Having due regard for the widespread feeling against "Queen Street Administration" and the communication and financial difficulties associated with such a large State, it was



agreed that the proposed Association would control the area from the border to Rockhampton.

 Formulation of a Constitution – perhaps based on BJSA with adjustments to suit particular requirements. AGREED

As a natural progression from the above meeting a Foundation General Meeting was held on the 8th October to launch the code of Women's Soccer firmly into the coming years as the SOUTH OUEENSLAND WOMEN'S SOCCER ASSOCIATION.

An application was made for affiliation with the QSF. In due course this was accepted by both the Management Committee and the Council of Clubs.



Statewide registrations varied from the earliest recorded figure of 1070 in 1976 through to the current 2239. Progress was steady for the first few years but dropped in the 80's. Some of

Initially, district affiliation was largely an informal affair with SQWSA acting as a central contact point to establish communications between districts. By 1980 a fee of \$10 had been introduced which then increased to \$20 plus \$2 per player (half of which went to the AWSA). When WSQ extended its boundaries to the whole State in 1993 the affiliation fee was set at \$150 per zone and \$10 per player (again half to the AWSA).



Districts outside SQWSA jurisdiction who entered the State Championships were initially required to pay an entry fee of \$20 which equalled member's affiliation fee. Bundaberg, with a healthy six team competition, became the first country area to seek affiliation. Further enquiries about affiliation were received from Gladstone, Gold Coast, Maryborough, Rockhampton, Toowoomba and Lismore (this last named centre was advised to contact the Northern NSW Association). South Burnett and Sunshine Coast affiliated a few years later.

Although not covered by the SQWSA area of jurisdiction until 1993, competitions were active in Cairns, Mackay, Mt.Isa and Townsville.

Various efforts were made to establish a North Queensland Association but although a temporary alliance between Mackay and Townsville enabled NQ to participate in the 1982 Australian Championship, it proved too difficult for the northern centres to create a workable Association.

Players have taken up positions on the Executive since the very first meeting. Prominent amongst these have been Margo Davidson, Jenny Osborne, Gail Williams, Sue Monteath, Joanne Millman, Kerry Millman and Lyn Spencer as well as others too numerous to list.

Past and present players would probably echo the feeling expressed by Secretary Margo Davidson who wrote in the Annual Report –

*During this season I have developed a different attitude towards soccer. As a player I enjoy the game and never used to worry about how things were organised, only making sure I got to the game on time.

But now as a member of the Executive I find it takes a great deal of hard work to put an Association together and keep it functioning well."

With the growth being experienced within the sport it was decided that it was appropriate for the Association to become incorporated and accordingly forms were obtained and Elaine Watson appointed to complete the requirements.

Incorporation took place following a Special Resolution passed on 27.3.1984 "That this Association apply to the Justice Department to become an incorporated Association under the Associations Incorporation Act 1981".

A basic Development Plan was devised in 1987 to target five specific areas –

Administration - Update Administration Manual Reprint Constitution * Newsletter * Recruit players for Executive

Funding - Promote use of facilities * Extend raffle program * Seek sponsor-ship for State Teams * Seek extra Govt. funding for facilities

Promotion – Promote Player of the Year * Maintain and update Record Book


Development - Commence Minor Competition earlier * Sponsor High School Competition * Introduce U/18 State Championship

Facilities - Upgrade Atlanta Field amenities
* Obtain plan for floodlighting

Then followed a budget which was prepared in line with the development program. Accounting forms were prepared for Team Managers to calculate costs and fees and to record periodic payments. These made life easier for the Treasurer and Team Officials.

There have been few avenues for fundraising which have not been explored since formation. Some of the ventures which have been undertaken by various administrations have been –

Sale of peanut bars • Street-corner collections • Raffles
• \$2 entry fee to the Hacienda Hotel on Sundays • Car
washes • "Buy a Brick Building Fund" (each brick cost
\$5) • Sale of pens • Parachute Drop (\$2 per m² of the
field) • Punk rock night • Benefit Meeting at Gabba
Greyhounds • Sale of Programs at FIFA World Youth
Championship • Silver Circle • Soccer Queen Quest.





For many years Fay Priestley was the fund-raising guru and her enthusiasm carried most projects to a profitable conclusion. More recently Director Gwen Fox (based in Rockhampton) organised a Statewide Art Union which enjoyed considerable success.

The canteen at Atlanta Field which has been under the capable direction of Arthur Watson for all but a couple of years, has been a steady source of profits as have the raffles conducted by Elaine Watson.

Donations have also played their part in keeping the wheels of progress turning. Patron Patsy Brusasco has always been to the forefront in this area. Corporate support has come from Coca-Cola, Barrier Seafoods, Melbourne Hotel and the Drug Abuse Prevention Program.

Sponsorship from Qantas and then from Ansett has certainly eased the cost associated with statewide meetings. Rixon Clothing who outfit teams free of charge have also done their bit to assist with the expense faced by our representative players.

Another source of funding was through the QSF Marketing Scheme. Profits were initially apportioned to QSF 60%, Juniors 30%, Women 10%. For reasons best known to the QSF the distribution to WSQ has been capped at \$2500 for the past four or five years but this is being taken up with the Marketing Committee.

By far the most extensive and reliable financial support comes by way of Government grants. Specific allocations enabled many programs to be implemented. The itemised grants have now been replaced by a lump sum subsidy with the WSQ Board being given the discretion to prioritise funding for the various projects submitted to the Dept. of Sport.

One of these priorities is the important area of coaching. For many years the establishment, led by the ASF National Coach, used a FIFA ruling (later proved to be non-existant) as justification to block participation by females in courses.

A letter which appeared in the Queensland Soccer Coaches Federation Coaching Review in the early years sets out Lyn Ketter's views on "Why Women Should Be Allowed To Play" and sadly, it was many years before the attitudes which prompted her letter were overcome.

"... It's true that Girls never played Soccer before, but then, neither did little boys or grown men. When Women wanted to play, it was the middle-aged defenders of tradition who griped.

Ladies Soccer is comparable to the Ladies Wimbledon singles. No one suggests that Chris Evert will ever beat Jimmy Connors, but she is just as entertaining to watch.

At Club level, we have the problem of some Clubs not accepting Women's Soccer as a serious sport. They forget that women bring money into the Club the same as the Juniors if not more ... We need proper coaching if we are to promote the Game but unfortunately a lot of so called proper Coaches see us as some sort of joke.


... We would like more Reps. (from QLD) in the Australian Team, but we need the help of qualified coaches at all levels ... at least we should be allowed to help ourselves by being able to attend your Coaching Courses.

I have attended a couple of the Courses at Tallebudgera NFC (which I appreciate very much) and although they were by no means easy for me the things I learnt about Football due to discussions with other Coaches at meal times would equal what I learnt out on the Park.

Anything less than a live-in course in my opinion would be second rate. Please Fellows! remember we don't want to TAKE OVER the sport, we just want equal opportunity to learn the Game equal access to Clubs, but to play our own game. WOMEN'S SOCCER IS HERE TO STAY."



JIM SELBY Australian Women's Coach

Jim Selby, the Australian Women's Coach, was invited to come to Brisbane to conduct a course for budding club coaches. Rather disappointingly eleven people nominated but only four eventually turned out for the first day and two for the second day. One of them was Graham Smith whose wife (Captain Lynn) had just given birth to twin girls a day or so earlier.

It was 1979 before there were sufficient women participants to conduct a Preliminary Coaching Course with a solely female squad.

Since then quite a few players have gained their coaching qualifications and have been active with either boy's or women's teams. For instance Lyn Ketter coached a boy's team to a win in the prestigious Harry Linning Shield and coached Redlands women's teams for several years. Michelle Sawyers' Coalstars U/14 girls have won the Premiership/Grand Final double while Joanne Millman and Sue Clayton have had success with boy's teams and Sue has coached the Brisbane South Juniors (girls).

The belief that all Coaches, from Club to State, should have appropriate qualifications has been incorporated into every Development Plan of the 90's.

Initially, the State Coach had been elected at the AGM and the team chosen by a selection panel. But three years later, it was decided that an appointment process would be more professional. All applicants were to be interviewed by a sub-committee consisting of the Qld Regional Director of Coaching, the Qld Director of Coaching (or Appointees of same) and two members of the SQWSA Executive Committee before a decision was made.

Eventually a requirement was set that State Coaches must have a minimum of Level 2 accreditation which was later upgraded to Level 3. Club Coaches who obtained accreditation during the season were recognised by the presentation of an Association Certificate.

Robins to travel to Cairns, Gladstone and Townsville conduct seminars for elite players and women's coaches. These courses proved very popular with all concerned but have been difficult to maintain in the face of ongoing financial restraints.


QLD's first attempt at a Youth Coaching Scheme was implemented in 1979 and was a great success mainly due to the hard work and dedication of Lyn Ketter.

Lyn and Trixie Barry (NSW) between them organised a Brisbane v Sydney U/14 match which was played on 13.10.79 for the Metropolitan Trophy which had been donated by these two coaches as a perpetual trophy with a view to establishing regular interstate matches at this level.

Readers will be familiar with many of the names from that team as the players went on to become the backbone of future state teams – Sue Clayton, Vanessa Clayton, A. Donnelly, Rebecca Donnelly, Lisa Eames, Lise Hadley, Kerry Millman (c), Kathy Mochrie, Debbie Painter, Katrina Paley, Fleur Parsons (vc), Leanne Priestley, Donna Story, Tracey Vines, Charmaine Wass, and Sharon Wass.

In 1980 an U/15 team went to Sydney where NSW defeated QLD 4-1 in a curtain-raiser for the Brisbane City v. Leichhardt match in the national Phillips Soccer League. With the introduction of national championships in age divisions this inter-city event faded from the scene.

Next came the placing of the U/17 and U/15 representative squads in the 1st Division and 2nd Division fixture competitions respectively in a move designed to match harden them for the National Championships. Their matches were played midweek under lights and the experiment proved so successful it has been retained.

A Junior Coaching program was set up a couple of years later which was aimed mainly at those players between 7 and 10. Helen Geoghegan was the organiser, the course ran for 4 weeks and ten players attended.

An SQWSA initiative saw the Association offer to sponsor a schools competition with \$200 for the winner and \$100 for the runner-up. It took twelve months for this offer to filter through to the various districts so that the inter-district final was then played at Geebung.

Promotion of the code then centred on introducing more Juniors to the game through schools and through either an U/12 or U/14 competition. This program proved difficult to establish as it relied on volunteer helpers during school hours. Fortunately, the regional DOC's usually open their school visits to boys and girls alike.

In 1992 there came a real boost to the coaching of elite players in the Youth division. Under the auspices of plans put forward by Jim Selby who was then State DOC, the Queensland Academy of Sport announced its acceptance of a soccer program for women – the first in Australia.

The introduction of Intensive Training Centres in recent years was welcomed as an extension of top-level coaching to the Junior division.

The coaches involved in these programs also provided important support to national players by supervising their training. The Head Coach was supported by two Assistant Coaches, one for women and one for men. The program also sponsored a female 'Scholarship Coach' to provide assistance to WSQ in the development of players by way of a feeder program to the QAS/ITC program.

Further variation was introduced in 1995 when the AWSA provided funding which enabled 25 young soccer players to sample the life of an elite soccer player during a six day live-in camp at Griffith University. This camp proved so successful that the AWSA planned to take the concept to other State Associations.

The culmination of all these schemes was the introduction by the AWSA of a women's national league for the 96/97 summer season. To establish this competition it was envisaged that initial entries would come from the ITC teams in each State on the East Coast of Australia. The success of this project should eventually lead to its expansion into an Australia-wide event.

The need for improved communications was increasing so plans were made to publish a monthly Newsletter for distribution to affiliates and players. Another aim was to have a 'Women's' page in the QSF GO SOCCER Magazine.

While soccer for women gained credibility after the first Australian Championship it was still exceedingly difficult to obtain quality coverage in the media. Many journalists persisted with the view that women playing a 'male' sport should not be taken seriously. It took considerable time to convince a few of the more liberal minded that women could and did play the game well.

Sometimes it seemed that the media was only interested when there was something contentious in the wind as when *This Day Tonight* tried to drum up a story about racism when three players didn't make the State team. Presented with the actual facts this attempt was quickly scuttled.

Television has been reluctant to commit to regular quality features. There have been interviews on Channel 7's Sportscene and snippets on Brisbane Grand Finals. SBS have provided some excellent coverage via a segment on the Open Titles in Alice Springs and the Australian U/16 Championship. Another item was a 45 minute package of highlights from the Pilot World Cup for Women held in China – great stuff which showed to a previously unaware audience the heights women's soccer had reached.

In common with the print media, TV sometimes could not decide whether women's soccer should be dealt with as a sport or a novelty interest item. This indecision was seen when TV's "Wombat Show" featured a match between Brisbane Youth (girls) and Annerley (boys) team.

In a drive to educate Publicity Officers at all levels a discussion paper was produced on the role of the suburban newspaper. This was accompanied by a suggested checklist for news releases aimed at securing maximum coverage for women's soccer. A Press Kit was also assembled to support this activity.

Publicity for women's soccer gradually increased due to the many articles published in the *Australian Soccer Weekly* (Don Balmain) and through regular items in the 'Women in Sport' column in the *Courier-Mail*. Ruby Robinson led the way for many years and then was followed by Eileen Grealy, Robyn Peach, Nicole Jeffery, LynneMarie Freh and Tracie Edmondson, just to name a few.

Minor sports have to bombard the media with tons of material to gain an ounce of space and it is a very frustrating business but one which cannot be neglected.

Under the direction of President Lyn Ketter, all areas of Queensland were canvassed in 1991 to see if there was general approval for the whole of the State to come under the jurisdiction of one Association. With the assistance of a grant from the AWSA. Executive members were able to visit Cairns, Gladstone, Gold Coast, Rockhampton, Toowoomba and Townsville to promote the concept.

As an interim measure affiliates accepted that the incoming Executive would act in a caretaker capacity for the first year. It was unanimously agreed that the new Association to control women's soccer throughout the State would be known as WOMEN'S SOCCER OUEENSLAND.

The inaugural meeting was held at the Southport Soccer Club on 29.2.1992. In attendance were representatives from the AWSA, Brisbane, Gold Coast, Mackay, North Queensland, Rockhampton and Toowoomba. Apologies were received from Far North Queensland, Gladstone, Maryborough, Mount Isa, South Burnett, Sunshine Coast and Wide Bay.

All affiliates had been circularised with various proposals and the meeting dealt with such matters as –

- · Aims of Women's Soccer Qld
- · What zone borders should be adopted
- · Affiliation/capitation fees
- Division of responsibilities between State and Affiliates
- · Voting rights and administrative structure
- Insurance
- · AWSA Grant for coaching assistance.

Discussions were wide ranging and amicable with many of the delegates quite enjoying the peer group interaction of their first taste of top-level administration.

Samantha O'Brien was given the responsibility of drafting a suitable Constitution for discussion at the Affiliates Meeting scheduled to be held at the State Titles in June.

It had now become obvious that the employment of a paid Secretary was the prime need in Administration. In view of financial constraints, it was planned that the position would commence as part-time and be expanded to full-time by 1995. To do this, increased Government funding would be required and when it became available in 1993 the position was advertised and interviews conducted.

The initial appointee was former Executive Member, Terri Gellatly. Office space was set aside at Terri's residence and furnished with a computer, photocopier, desks and filing cabinets.

The 24 hours per week working time was divided between State and Brisbane activities on a ratio of one quarter State and three quarters Brisbane. The balance of funding which was required over and above the Government subsidy was apportioned accordingly.

After nearly twelve months on the job, Terri found that the pressure to establish a secretariat from the ground up had become too much and tendered her resignation. In her stead long-time administrator-cum-team official, Fay Dower, applied for and was appointed to fill the vacancy.

During her tenure, Terri had established a Soccer Data-base which could be applied state-wide and also provide the necessary information for National statistics.

In her turn, Fay established a State Newsletter titled *From the Side Line*. The workload associated with the World Masters Games also made sure that Fay had very little spare time in her first year in office.

As with many similar positions the work performed far exceeds the hours paid for and it was hoped to make the position 'full time' in pay as well as work.

A 3 year Development and Financial Plan comprising some 40 pages was submitted to the State Government by WSQ and separate sets of By-laws for both Queensland and Brisbane were drafted so that each could be administered by separate committees.

The Brisbane competition then became an autonomous sub-committee of WSQ. This arrangement solved the problems associated with joint ownership of the HQ grounds and the joint employment of the Administrator.

Whilst it was planned that the Brisbane AGM would continue to be held in November of each year, the State AGM would now be held at the beginning of each year and would be staged in various centres around the State in line with the Championship venues.

Trevor Watson facilitated the drafting of a further 3-year Development Plan which expanded on the previous document. Although starting out under the impression that a 3-year Budget Plan was required, he quickly adapted. The result was a plan which complied with the extensive Government guidelines and set out achievable progression in all areas.

Two year terms for members of the Executive Committee were introduced but to ensure a degree of continuity half were elected each year.

In line with the staged development of the full State Association, the caretaker officials stood down at the end of their year of service and all positions on the Board were open for election. The President, Treasurer and Director (1) were scheduled to hold office for a full term and the Vice-President, Secretary and Director (2) would be subject to reelection after twelve months.

With assistance from the State Government, a seminar was held in Bundaberg to assist in the formation of a Wide Bay Association.

This exercise converted the past informal grouping of Bundaberg, Maryborough, Hervey Bay and South Burnett into a well-ordered Council in which benefits and obligations were clearly defined.

The evolution of the current administrative structure has been the result of increased participation and expansion to a state-wide association. It has also been due to the adaptability and vision of the officials concerned who devoted their considerable energies to the task.



HEADQUARTERS GROUND



t was in 1977 that SQWSA made the first attempt to obtain a Headquarters field by applying to the Department of Defence for the use of grounds at El Alamein Barracks. Publicity Officer Bert Fry was very active in this endeavour, but unfortunately Government rules and regulations would not allow this suggestion to proceed.

The following year Elaine Watson negotiated with the Hamilton Junior Soccer Club for the use of their grounds at Pinkenba. In due course, their assets were purchased for the grand sum of \$400 and their grounds and clubhouse became SQWSA headquarters for the season.

Later in the year however, when SQWSA sought a transfer and extension of the lease it was found that the Brisbane City Council had already leased the grounds to the local Labor Branch and their rugby league team.

When the situation was brought to the attention of Lord Mayor Frank Sleeman, he personally intervened in the search for an alternate venue and suggested the area which is now known as Atlanta Field in Geebung.

It was planned to commence operations the following year as considerable work had to be done on the fields and on the construction of a facility containing such basic amenities as dressing rooms, referees room, equipment storage and canteen.

At the beginning of 1980 a Building Loan for \$10000 was taken out to supplement the \$5000 Government grant. It was anticipated that repayments would be met through increased player registrations and a specific Building Levy of \$2 per player. Guarantors for the Bank Loan were Ian Brusasco, Arthur & Elaine Watson, Denis O'Donovan, Trevor Patrick, David & Jan Monteath and Keith Barclay.

By the end of the year, Ted Wilcox (Grounds Committee Chairman) was able to report –

"Nearly 2000 metres of good soil dropped on the fields at no cost to the Association. After it had been spread and graded the fields were treated with dolomite. Couch and Jap Millet seed were sown – the millet giving the seedling couch protection until established. The concrete slab and drainage have been completed and the building finished to lock-up stage. Originally 25 gum trees were planted on the Delaware street frontage but there are only 20 left – 1 died of natural causes and 4 have been spirited away. Many thanks to those who have helped with the many tedious jobs such as picking up rocks and removing sensitive weed".

After struggling financially at the start of the season, the Association found that a great deal of work was able to be implemented in the off season.

Adrian Klupfel donated his services to install the plumbing which saved the Association around \$600. An irrigation system was installed – cost was minimal thanks to Keith Priestley. Brian Williams, Geoff Osborne and Gerry Harris completed the dressing rooms and canteen.

Bill Steiner was proving to be a tower of strength in doing all the electrical work on the Amenities Block and providing the PA System which is still doing sterling service.

Gail Williams, who was employed by Dulux Australia, arranged for the Amenities Block to be used for a demonstration of roof spraying by a subsidiary (Paint N Paper). This meant that the roof was sprayed at no cost to the Association.

As a tribute to the late Dot Moore, Registrar and Foundation Member of SQWSA who passed away on the 6th April, a fund was established which eventually provided for the terracing and gardens at the entrance to this facility and the sign which proudly announced that Atlanta Field was the Headquarters of the South Queensland Women's Soccer Association. Bardon-Latrobe, Annerley and Logan were prominent among subscribers.

The opening ceremony for the Atlanta Field Facility was conducted at the Watson Shield Final by

Alderman Roy Harvey on 5th April, 1981. This was a venture which showed the way to the rest of Australia and proved itself to be THE major achievement of the relatively short existence of SQWSA.

An Honour Board was purchased to recognise Life Members, Guarantors and Donors. The acknowledgements for those who offered major support for the Geebung Facility were –

Ted Wilcox (Grounds Controller) made special mention of "Geoff Osborne, Keith Barclay, Rob Roosen, Bill Steiner, Jack Wass (who supplied the goal posts) and Elaine Watson who has not spared herself the whole season, carrying the work load of three people: Elaine I salute you, you and we have done it". Not to mention the time and effort which Ted himself had devoted to Atlanta.

Leading up to the staging of the National Championship in 1982, a willing band of volunteers worked tirelessly to ensure the event was a success.

Ted Wilcox arranged for the fields to be top-dressed with sawdust as this would soften the playing surface without hindering the run of the ball during games. This treatment was a great success even though one team complained that the top-dressing caused grazes on players who executed slide tackles.

Gerry Harris erected temporary seating on both sides of the field and the Watson caravan was installed as a medical treatment room cum official tent. It also doubled as accommodation for Brian Shelton of N/NSW who was left on guard overnight as caretaker.

Arthur and Elaine Watson were convenors for the canteen and were ably assisted by Nell Wilcox. AUF donated a freezer cabinet which was still in use in 1997. Mal Bland (Steeden) donated two balls.

Gradually other improvements were made – the ceilings in the dressing rooms were repaired and reinforced by Ted Clayton and more seating provided. A telephone was connected, a deep freezer obtained for the canteen and a spray marker for the grounds.

For several years Nundah Athletics used Geebung for their cross-country season.

When the final payment was made on the bank loan in 1986, letters of thanks were sent to all guarantors and the following was received from Ian Brusasco –

"Dear Elaine,

The other day I received from Westpac a document releasing me from any liability on my guarantee. The only reason I write is that I have guaranteed many things in my time, but this is the first time I can remember getting a document releasing me. I want to congratulate the SQWSA on the excellent job they have done and in particular, clearing themselves of their debt."

improvements and new equipment were ongoing projects which saw the purchase of a ride-on mower and nearly \$5000 spent on work on the building and fields.

At the start of one year it was found that the grounds were under attack from an introduced weed which had spread like wild-fire. A concerted and extensive treatment to eliminate this problem was carried out by Gerry Harris and Council officials. Thanks to their exertions the grounds were ready for the commencement of fixtures.

A five year Ground Development Plan set out that the fields were to be top dressed, seeded and fertilised every second year and spiked and top-dressed in the alternate year. A new sprinkler system was also installed. The carpark was upgraded to the tune of \$7490 but it was decided not to invest any further funds in ground maintenance until some firm decision could be reached with the BCC as to whether SQWSA would be remaining at Geebung or transferring to another venue.

SQWSA considered that further expansion such as a Clubhouse (office and meeting space, further income) and floodlighting (representative training, mid-week games) had become imperative. Negotiations were commenced with the Council with regard to the extent of development they would or would not allow at Geebung.

These discussions had almost reached a positive solution when (as had become the norm for these discussions), the ground rules were changed at the 11th hour and so the saga continued.

Correspondence and meetings indicated that – (a) floodlighting for one field at Geebung had been approved; and (b) the Council would approve a Clubhouse sited behind the kindergarten. Then there came the stipulation that no fixtures would be allowed under lights and this was followed by the ruling that council would not allow the Clubhouse to be licensed.

It seemed that no-one in the Council had read the WSQ proposal in its entirety or if they had they didn't realise or accept that limitations regarding licensed premises and night games had the effect of nullifying the whole concept.

WSQ officials examined every tip site, every isolated and/or unacceptable ground in Brisbane along with some which were eminently suitable but eventually proved unobtainable.

By 1995 the Brisbane City Council were still not prepared to make a positive commitment to enable WSQ to establish alternative HQ grounds. Every time there seemed to be one step forward a change of attitude and/or officials moved WSQ two steps back.

At one stage it looked likely that Murarrie would be accepted but it ended up a Category C rating after promises of Category A. Although this was later amended to Category B after the neighbourhood was canvassed for support, the Council again said, "No lights, no licensed premises" which put paid to Murarrie.

Next came the offer of an area known as Yandina Picnic Reserve off Wecker Road, Mt.Gravatt. As this area was surrounded on three sides by dense bushland and on the remaining side there was a school and just one house, this site seemed the most positive chance to date.

The hoodoo attached to WSQ negotiations struck as soon as it became public knowledge that Council proposed to lease the Reserve to WSQ. It appeared that the area (which was already used as a soccer field by the school) was in the middle of a flora/fauna corridor, that licenced premises would lead to increased vandalism and drunkenness and that when Wecker Road was extended to link up with Scrub Road there would be innumerable drunken drivers 'hooning' through a residential area.

Never before had the Association realised what forces for evil were hidden beneath the law-abiding face that players and supporters had maintained for twenty years!

Hopefully, it will not be too long before WSQ will be possessed of a Headquarters and grounds worthy of a State Association and the sportswomen of Queensland.

LIFE MEMBER - BOB GEOGHEGAN



Back in 1965 when the Brisbane Junior Soccer Association started a women's soccer competition with four teams, I hoped that the competition would grow. I did not envisage that by this year (1997) it would be an Olympic Games sport.

My thirteen years from 1965 as Coach and Manager of the Annerley Ladies Team were very enjoyable years. The friendliness and rivalry were great. I am extremely proud to be a foundation member with Elaine (Watson), Dot (Moore) and Betty (Melton) and also to be the first Life Member.

Our first years were a battle but thanks to Elaine, Arthur (Watson) and many others the sport became what it is now. Not many today would know how much hard work, money and long hours were put in by Elaine (and Arthur) to keep the Association moving and growing. I think she has earned a medal.

LIFE MEMBER - TED WILCOX


Like many before him and many since, Ted Wilcox was roped into women's soccer because his daughter (Karen) played and what a valuable contribution he made over the years.

LIFE MEMBER - KEITH BARCLAY

It is almost 30 years since I first started coaching Coalstars' women soccer players in 1968 – an activity I began because of my long-time interest in soccer and because three of my daughters (Gail, Lorraine and Michelle) and a niece (Corrinna) played.

When a Committee was formed as a lead-up to a separate Women's Association, I was one of the original members and then went on to become Senior Vice President and Fixtures Controller of the SQWSA from 1975 to 1983. I was Junior Vice President in 1986 and 1987.

In 1976, eight years after I first started coaching the women's team, they won the inaugural SQWSA Premiership and Grand Final at Carina.

I coached junior girls at Coalstars from 1983 until my retirement in 1990. Some of the players that I coached who later gained representative honours were Belinda and Tamara Kitching, Louise McMurtrie and Bryony Duus (who is presently in Georgia USA on a soccer scholarship).

Some of the senior players that I had the honour of coaching were my daughters Gail (Williams) and Michelle (Sawyers), Bev Watts, Desley Klupfel, Teri McQueen and Kaylene Janssen (who learned her early soccer at Soccerettes under Carl Fenech's tuition). Michelle and Kaylene became Australian players. My apologies if I have overlooked other players who gained District, State and National honours as my memory is not as good as it once was.

From 1970 to 1985 I organised the annual Gold Coast Carnival which started with six teams and finished up with more than twenty. Over the years, teams came from Sydney, Newcastle, Lismore, Gladstone, Rockhampton, Dalby and Toowoomba as well as



Brisbane and the Gold Coast to take part at the end of each season.

I also staged the Val Broadbent Carnival and the Ken Barclay Memorial in Ipswich during the 1980s with entries from as far afield as Lismore and Bankstown.

Michelle and I share a unique double as the only father and daughter coaches to win an SQWSA Premiership/Grand Final double – mine in 1976 as previously mentioned while Michelle's was in 1995 with the Caolstars U/14 team.

I recall the years of my involvement with great fondness and hope that the Olympics in 2000 will see Australia with a medal.

LIFE MEMBER - ELAINE WATSON



How do you reduce the planning, the work, the feelings, the joys and the sorrows of 23 years into a few small paragraphs? I could easily fill a book and most likely bore everyone to tears in the process.

Suffice to say that I became involved in women's soccer by chance rather than by plan or by having a daughter involved. I had already been Secretary for Mackay Juniors and a coach and a manager for boy's teams and had become the first female referee in Australia.

It was not till many years later that I realised what a quandary I presented to the all-male establishment when, in all innocence, I turned up for the referees' course not knowing it had never happened before. To their credit the Mackay and Brisbane Referees Associations were the first of the 'establishment' to provide equal access to females.

For me it was very much a case of being in the right place at the right time when I moved into National and State administration. A movie quote says "Seize the Day" so I did way back in 1974 and have had no regrets even if I have had plenty of frustrations and quite a few disappointments.

Looking back I realise that as women's soccer expanded so too did my aims, expectations and attitudes. At first I saw everything in black and white and decisions were not difficult to make. But the more I became involved the more I realised that on many subjects there was more than one valid point of view. This made me a bit cautious about leaping before I had a good long look.

So I suppose it would be safe to say that it is not only the players who learn and develop and find themselves stretched to make the most of their capabilities. Women's soccer became part of my family and we grew together.

The memories that endure are not of the set-backs but of the hectic activity at the State Championships

and the more laid back but still tense National Championships. The thrill of an overseas tournament and the novelty of visiting nine countries (some more than once). Best of all though are the wonderful friends I have made along the way. What more could anyone ask?

I hope to be in attendance when Australia wins a medal at the Sydney Olympics - you can be sure that whatever the outcome there will be no-one prouder of Australia than the old girl yelling her head off in the grandstand!

Then THEY had to go searching for the relevant passage and usually ended up dropping the whole business.

The years I spent developing Atlanta Field were very satisfying to me as I am happiest when working with my hands. I am very proud to have been a part of the growth and development of women's soccer.

I was first introduced to women's soccer when serving on the Committee of the BJSA. I suggested that my wife Elaine referee a potentially fiery match at Bardon one Sunday as she was the only qualified female referee in Australia at the time. She obliged and the result was a few yellow cards and one red.

A while later I 'volunteered' Elaine for the job of forming a women's team to take to Sydney for the first National Championship. From then on it was GO GO GO with both of us up to our ears in women's soccer.

The Brisbane competition had only eight teams the first year and the first Presentation Night for the newly formed Association was held in a very small hall at Tarragindi. My brother Ray and I did the catering for a sell-out crowd of about 120.

I was proud to be elected an Honorary Vice President in the years from 1976 to 1986 (when this

position apparently became redundant) during which time my employers (QUF and Barrier Seafoods) provided sponsorship for the Association.

A few years down the track came Geebung. Many a day was spent picking up rocks/glass/wire from the rather parched ground. I set up the original Canteen which was manned by myself, Elaine and Nell Wilcox for the first year. Ted and Nell then took over in 1982.

Since then I have been the convenor from 1984–1989 and 1992 to the present – a grand total of 12 years.

My activities as MC for quite a few Presentation Nights and as MC for the Player of the Year Award since its inception 15 years ago have always given me much enjoyment.

I was honoured to be made a Life Member in 1985.

LIFE MEMBER - FAY DOWER

When asked to provide an article for this book I wondered just what form it should take. Although I have held quite a few administrative positions, I thought that my experiences on tour might be more entertaining.

I feel very strongly that Managers and other officials of representative teams experience much more on tours than just soccer. I believe that a player going away to represent her area or State develops in many ways and this development is not confined to what happens in a game or at training. I have had many an experience which I never dreamed would result from taking on the responsibility of caring for a group of girls on tour.

I would like to share with you, the reader, some "Memories and Musings of a Many Time Manager".

1983 Canberra - the excitement and joy on the faces of players who had never experienced such cold - they had to literally break the ice on the field during the warm-up before the first game of the day.

1984 Newcastle – the team running foul of a girl called Charity who provided them with entertainment for many a year.

1985 Hobart – the U/15 Manager having to resort to fisticuffs to protect his charges – a peeping tom being dismissed from the premises – the two teams having a sight-seeing walk on Sunday and taking 4 hours to find somewhere open for lunch – imagine 36 starving Queenslanders all in tracksuits sitting on the footpath outside the one and only Kentucky Chicken outlet eating lunch at 3.00pm!!! and the wet weather!!!

1986 Sydney – the Queensland teams singing outside the grounds to entertain all the other teams – someone had forgotten to get a key to unlock the gates for the opening ceremony!! Losing a player at the Opera House only to have her run back to us with police hot on her trail!!! – relief when told she had not been in trouble, the officers were only making sure she returned safely.

1987 Brisbane – disappointment at the lack of hometown support – falling in the rain and smashing my lip and nose on the logs surrounding the garden during a late night security check on players at the motel.

1988 Melbourne – disbelief that Melbourne actually had suburbs that were called 'dry suburbs' – no alcohol sold at all – thought we were back in prohibition days.



1988 Newcastle - amazement at the constitution of players walking the sand dunes each day before breakfast.

1989 Darwin – delight at winning the Championship – watching in fascination as some players tried crocodile burgers at the crocodile farm – having a sunset barbecue while watching the huge tides in Darwin harbour.

1990 Melbourne – the fun of taking the whole team to the home of a Victorian committee member for a barbecue and games night – going tobogganing on the snowfields.

1991 Woy Woy – meeting old friend Skeet Butler again and winning on the pokies for once.

1991 Canberra – players determination to avenge the tag of 'Dad's Army' by winning the Championship – beating the Blues twice in one week to do it – great team spirit.

1992 Hobart – horror when a room was burnt out – relief that no one was home and nothing of value lost.

1992 Brisbane – abject disappointment in losing to Victoria in the final on our home ground.

1993 Sydney – absolute delight at beating the Blues in the final – sightseeing around the old suburbs of Windsor and Richmond – amazed that such pioneer places still existed.

1994 Melbourne – cold, windy, raining – constant for the entire week and the senior team shopaholics!!

1995 Adelaide – disappointment in some team members' attitudes to their teammates and the job they were there to do – disillusionment with some players whom I had known over many years.

1995 Hobart – the faces of girls who had never seen snow – the bus bogged in a snow drift during a blizzard on top of Mt Wellington – a Mossman player having the time of her life rolling happily in the snow.

1996 Darwin – the team bus decorated and christened 'Priscilla, Queenslander of the Desert' – providing the entertainment at half time in the final with a rendition of the Macarena – team spirit making up for the not-so-good scoreboard.

These are the memories which are important to me. Win or lose, Queensland always participated, always did their best, mostly with pride and mostly with good spirit. To have played a small part in the lives and development of so many of Queensland's talented players has been great.

LIFE MEMBER - HAZEL MILLMAN



Hazel was interested in soccer from an early age. Her brothers (Alec, Les and Noel) played for Shafston Rovers and United Rangers in the 1920s and 1930s. So it was only natural that all her eight children – Helen, Ron, Ray, Allan, Keith, Gary, Joanne and Kerry – would play.

It was 1963 when Hazel really began her long involvement with soccer. Four of her sons signed on that year to play with Southside Aston Villa (later to become Easts Aston Villa, then Merton East and finally Eastern Suburbs). She became an active member of the club doing canteen duty whenever she could. 1964 saw her husband Harry become Club Secretary and also saw Kerry's birth.

In 1966 Harry died but after this tragedy she became even more involved with club activities. Hazel was canteen convenor from then until about 1987 when failing eyesight forced her to stop.

Not content with this workload, Hazel branched into women's soccer. She was a committee member in

1982 and SQWSA Secretary for six years from 1985 to 1990. She could also be relied on to lend a hand in the canteen at Atlanta Field whenever she was needed.

Hazel was a keen supporter at many National Championships even venturing to Alice Springs in 1987 where she and Vi Hawkins (Elaine Watson's mum) were dubbed 'rent-a-crowd'.

Daughters Joanne and Kerry were regular Queensland representatives from 1979 to 1993 and Australian reps from 1981 to 1989. Joanne has the distinction of being the only player to have won Player of the Year twice.

Hazel's son Ron made every Brisbane Age Team from the time he began playing in 1963. In the 70s and 80s he was a regular member of the Queensland team and received the highest honour in Brisbane soccer by being named 1984 Rothman's Medal Winner.

In 1976 she was awarded Life Membership by Merton East and on the 26th July, 1992 Eastern Suburbs honoured her with the opening of the Hazel Millman Tennis Courts, but sadly on the 11th December Hazel passed away quite suddenly.

AS A PLAYER -

 The day I played my first game for Wondall United in 1974, I had no idea of how to play the game and my husband spent 5 minutes watching the play and having a good laugh before disappearing with the two kids.

After the final whistle I found the three of them in the playground with my other half clutching his right arm and daughter Kim running to me saying, "Mummy, Daddy fell off the slippery slide!"

After an afternoon at the hospital he was diagnosed with a broken collar bone and spent the next few weeks off work. Guess who got the blame?

 In 1975 I travelled to New Zealand with the first club team to travel overseas – the Wynnum Women's Team which won the Union Travel Trophy. I played club soccer from 1974 to 1984 and represented QLD in 1977. Guess who had the last laugh??

- Being asked to be the first Youth (U/18) Coach for the 1978 State Titles – this team was titled Brisbane South.

- Being asked to leave the 1977 Level 3 Coaching Course by the National Coaching Director when he arrived to visit the Course. He stated, "It is a FIFA rule that women and men cannot participate on the field together either as a coach or a player."
- Not being contacted by the State DOC in 1991 for the twelve months follow-up assessments which were necessary to achieve my Level 3.
- Being unable to conquer my fear of flying which has impeded my career in the area which is my chief love – coaching.

AS AN ADMINISTRATOR -

- Resigning as a Committee member when asked to become a Guarantor for Geebung.
- · Life Membership.
- · Being a part of setting up Women's Soccer Qld. Inc.

What stands out from all those years in all those roles are the friendships I have made and sustained to this day, of the characters I've met, of the personal growth and confidence I've gained and the people whose lives have intertwined with mine.

Thank you to my family, thank you Women's Soccer.

Guenter's involvement with women's soccer began in 1975 as a club coach with Wynnum and then continued with Southside Eagles. From there he graduated to Brisbane Coach in 1980 and State Open Coach in the same year.

Starting from 1983 he spent six years as Brisbane Youth Coach and after a year as State U/15 Coach he became State Youth Coach for the next nine years. In that time his Youth Teams won the National Championships in 1989, 1992 and 1993 and were runners-up in 1988/90/91.

Guenter was appointed State Open Coach in 1994, 1995 and 1996 when his teams finished 3rd, 2nd and 6th.

No-one could deny that his endeavours over the years played a big part in moulding the careers of a great many of the States' representative players.

LIFE MEMBER - FRED ROBINS



Fred had just been awarded Queensland Coach of the Year by the QSF when he was appointed as Senior Women's Coach. In his first year as Brisbane Coach his team lost the State Open Final but then came an extraordinary run of 25 games where his Brisbane Team was never beaten.

Queensland Open Teams coached by Fred Robins won National Championships in 1982, 1984 and 1991. In the first win the QLD team scored 15 points from a possible 18 and in the second were undefeated with 5 wins and 3 draws. In 1991 his team won both the National Title and the Challenge Cup winning all their games with the exception of one draw.

His nomination for Life Member read:

"His enthusiasm and the many hours he has put in each year in training sessions, games and National Titles prove his dedication to women's soccer. While he is regarded by many as a hard taskmaster as a Coach, the knowledge and fitness instilled in his players often made the difference between winning and losing the big games.

Fred coached the Brisbane Open teams from 1982 to 1991 to State Championships in all but the first where the team were semi-finalists. He coached the State Open Team from 1982 to 1992 (excepting 88/89) for an impressive record of 3 times National Champions, 5 times runners-up and a third placing.

He was made an Honorary Vice-President of SQWSA in 1981 and has always made himself available to help any club coaches and share his knowledge and dry sense of humour."

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

ueensland bears the proud record of being the only State to have competed in every division of every National Championship since their commencement in 1974.

When the number of players available for the Youth and Junior Divisions in the early years is taken into account, this has not been an easy record to maintain. On one occasion only 19 players nominated for the representative trials in the Junior Division.

The first championship in 1974 was quite an eyeopener. At that time there were 8 teams competing under the banner of the Brisbane Junior Soccer Association.

Policy of the day was to appoint a member of the BJSA Executive as organiser of any such team and there were only two women on the Executive at that time (Hazel Pickup and Elaine Watson). Elaine's husband Arthur (also on the Executive) had previously 'volunteered' her as referee of the annual grudge match between leading teams Annerley and Grovely Budapest, and now volunteered her again.

Hazel graciously declined any involvement (actually the speed with which she declined was rather unflattering to women's soccer), so Elaine was given approximately 6 weeks to choose a team and to arrange accommodation, flights, playing strip and travelling outfits.

To facilitate the selection process, all the women's fixtures for the next weekend were allocated to Carina, which was the BJSA Headquarters Ground. There was no time to study form or to discuss

selections with team coaches – a once only viewing and bingo! the team was chosen for better or worse.

Annerley Coach Bob Geoghegan was pressed into service to run training sessions and trial games prior to departure. The first training night was pretty hectic as names, addresses, phone numbers and sizes for gear had to be obtained. It has to be said that Elaine recognised only one or two of her selections at close quarters and without their identifying club colours.

After several weeks of frantic activity, all these arrangements fell into place and the team was off on the great adventure. The other teams entered were NSW, N/NSW, VIC and WA. Brisbane was the only team in travelling gear and very smart they looked too.

The one page information sheet issued to all players gave the flights and times, the match program, colours for each match (two sets of shirts provided, one red and one white) and finished up with the following –

CLOTHING

BJSA will supply each player with:

- 1 white shirt
- 1 red shirt (Goalie gold and blue)
- 1 pr Brisbane socks all these to be returned
- 1 Brisbane badge
- 1 embroidered pocket these become player's.

Players have purchased:

- 1 slacksuit
- 1 red blouse

• 1 pr Brisbane socks – \$40

Subscription to Airfare

- \$25

Proceeds from raffles and gate takings have enabled SQWSA to purchase for each player:

- 4 Brisbane badges (for exchange with opposing teams)
- 1 Carry bag \$6.25

Official travelling uniform of slacksuit, blouse and shoes (preferably dark – no track shoes allowed) will be worn travelling to and from Sydney and to any official function which may be arranged during the Tour. It is suggested that team members bring an alternate blouse of white in case of extra functions to which it may be desirable to wear uniform.

Team members should be sure to pack:

- Soccer boots
- 2 pr white shorts
- Spare laces
- Tracksuit (if possible)
- · Shoe cleaning gear

As team members will be billeted during the Tour, it is suggested that a small gift be provided (\$2 value - chocolates or toiletries) for billeters.

No doubt the members of today's teams will be comparing these spartan provisions and modest costs with those currently in vogue. Not so modest though when it is realised that \$65 equalled 3 weeks wages in 1974.

Because the BJSA only funded one official (Manager Elaine Watson), Bob Geoghegan left early on the Friday to drive to Sydney at his own expense. The team arrived at 4pm, met their billeters, had a rush dinner and were back at the grounds in time for their 8.30pm game. Having thought of themselves as 'BRISBANE', the team now found they were listed as 'QUEENSLAND' by the organisers.

By the time Bob arrived at the venue QLD were half way through the game and the Manager was wondering why both striker and goalie were giving her heart attacks with several mis-kicks and fingertip saves. When the problem was outlined to Bob he had a good laugh. "Don't you know they are both night blind?" he said. (Contact lenses had not yet come into common usage).

The billeting arrangements were very satisfactory for all except three girls who were assigned to the local Club President's daughters. They found that the electricity had been disconnected from the house, the pet dogs were fed from the only baking dish the players could see which made them not too keen on eating home cooking and there were two fellows also in residence.

Their hosts' behaviour was very decorous until bedtime when the patter of footsteps up and down the hall showed a less than platonic lifestyle was in progress. When a very tired and very innocent Queenslander responded to a regular knocking on the other side of the wall beside her bed by calling "Come in" the other two really broke up as they were well aware of what the sounds meant.

When this state of affairs came to the ears of the other billeters they were most upset at the situation but the three musketeers did not want to cause any problems by moving and said they would stick it out. Every night for the following week the other families provided hot meals and showers before delivering the fearless trio back to their billets.

QLD were not amused at half time in the match against NSW to see the opposing team scuttle for the comfort of the only available dressing room leaving them standing in a bitterly cold wind and pouring rain.

The last match of the tournament was a vital one as a win for QLD would have made them runners-up on points, whilst a 2–2 draw would have had the same result on goal average over WA. However the team was very tired and several players were nursing injuries which did not allow them to perform to the standard of their previous games and the match was lost 1–2.

The Championship points table read:

The final game was followed by a barbecue at which presentations were made to every team except QLD – NSW 'winners', N/NSW 'runners-up', WA for 'travelling furthest' and VIC for 'trying hard'. The perceived discourtesy of this omission on top of the dressing room incident, probably provided the initial fuel for the deep rivalry between QLD and NSW which has been apparent in every championship since then.

The next day the players and their hosts went into the city for the day. Some young billeters were refused concession fares as the bus driver reckoned they were too old to be schoolies. Vera O'Donovan (31 and the mother of three children) caused quite an uproar when she removed her wedding and engagement rings, asked for child's fare and was given a ticket. When the girls shouted the truth at him the driver just said, "Quit your fooling and get on board!"

The players had a great time and brought home fake newspapers with headlines such as "ELAINE WATSON QUITS DRINKING – 9 BARS GO BROKE" (it must be said that Elaine is teetotal) and another which read "SOCCER GIRL DANCES NAKED IN HOTEL – JAILED OVERNIGHT". At the next BJSA meeting when these posters were tabled the first one did not raise a comment (was this because the Executive believed or did not believe it?) while the second caused some consternation until the penny dropped!

This team really had a 'baptism of fire' into the representative arena – not only with billetting problems but also just by being the first to compete. With a brand new team, brand new Manager and brand new event, their cheerful acceptance of all conditions and their enthusiasm for the game more than qualified them for the current buzz-word 'elite' in its highest definition.

The whole experience saw Elaine Watson on such a high that she needed no real urging to divert her energies from the BJSA to women's soccer.

The second Championship was played on 'home ground' so to speak – Annerley and Perry Park – but it wasn't until the following year that the State Government approved a grant of \$150 to assist with a rather basic list of expenses:

\$50: Advertising – Pamphlets for shop/car windows, Newspaper advertisements with program and times

\$50: Printing of program (Margo Davidson worked for Watson & Ferguson who quoted cost price)

\$281: Trophies

\$105: Referees' Fees (returned as a donation)

Gate takings for the matches at Perry Park were \$91.

An enthusiastic committee had arrangements well in hand by the end of the domestic competition. The program had been set but the last minute entry of a team from NT necessitated quite a re-shuffle of timings. To further complicate matters Queensland electricity workers decided to call a state-wide strike which meant the Monday games had to be staged in the afternoon rather than under floodlights.

Doris Haddock and Lynn Smith both had write-ups in the *Sports Pictorial* Magazine whose reporter was very loud in his praise for both players. Doris' flatmates were not quite as complimentary – they said "she is used to the no hands bit in soccer and continues the principle around the house ... especially around washing up time." Good one Doris!!

The NSW Team from the previous year were competing in the Asian Cup in Hong Kong which meant that this year's team was missing quite a few 'star' players. Consequently the competition for Champion was very even.

QLD and WA were both going well and it was obvious that their match was vital to the final result. As the game commenced, the storm clouds which had been building up all day were getting heavier and heavier. The tight schedule had no provisions for delays or replays so it was here that the organisers had to face the unfortunate timing of the strike.

A goal was awarded to WA in circumstances which were hotly disputed by QLD and a degree of desperation was evident as the Queenslanders fought to equalise in a race against both the storm and full time. Ten minutes before the final whistle the game was called off when the referee could not see his linesman in the gathering gloom.

It was a gloom which was equalled by every team member when they were informed that the game would be awarded to WA for the spurious reason "that the organising committee should have scheduled the match to enable it to finish before the light failed". Given the time constraints of the Championship no-one expected the decision to be otherwise but such a rationale given by a committee chaired by a West Australian was a bitter pill for QLD to swallow.

A National Best and Fairest Team was named and two Queenslanders – Lynn Smith (captain) and Maria Radenovic (goalie) were included.

These two tours (home and away) provided the benchmark for other tours. As can be imagined, the touring experience usually ranges from "excellent" to "it was all right I guess" for players and from "excellent" to "that's it, never again" for officials

Fortunately for officials, a really bad tour only comes along once every three or four years and the goodwill from the others tides them over – rather like your average golfer where one good swing makes you forget the ten bad ones. For many years officials paid their own way, so it was expecting a great deal from them to have to cope with disruptive behaviour on top of paying for the privilege.

Every so often there comes a push from a few players along the lines of "Why do WE have to obey rules YOU set out?". They will turn their baby blues onto an official and say "No-one else has rules" or "Why can't I? – nothing will happen to me" – but the truth is that other States DO have rules (and those that don't often regret it).

A Code of Conduct has evolved from past events which has given QLD an enviable reputation with other States. But it is when these Rules are queried and/or broken that the fun begins. The manager has to perform a balancing act to keep control in what is effectively a 'family' of 18 girls, all of an age, but with 18 different personalities – not all of them lawabiding.

The coach usually has few problems because he/she has the ultimate deterrent of who takes the field – quite an effective on-the-spot punishment.

Championships are played in all sorts of conditions from the heat of Darwin to the bitter cold which Melbourne and Hobart can turn on, from the glaring sun of Brisbane to the rain and roaring gales that Canberra, Adelaide, Perth and Woy Woy have offered now and again, from the hard grounds of Brisbane and Alice Springs to the mud and flooding of southern states.

Rough fields, small fields – you name it and play has gone on regardless. Some grounds have had more than adequate facilities and others have had barely enough. On one southern trip a QLD player was overheard to mutter, "Compared to this, Geebung is Wembley".

Queensland originally had a selection panel to choose a squad. From that squad the coach would name the final team subject to the Executive's approval. Gradually, it became accepted that if the Coach had to stand or fall by results, then he should have the freedom to choose his own team and the selection panel became redundant.

It was also accepted in the early days that the only officials a team needed were a coach and a manager. Then a Team Leader was appointed to handle administrative requirements such as civic receptions and AWSA meetings. Next addition was a trainer/physio so that medical treatment was immediately to hand.

Fortunately, apart from the usual muscle strains, the occasional black eye such as sustained by Joanne Millman in Darwin or the virus which prevented Nella Bertoncini setting foot on the pitch in Canberra, there have been very few major problems such as the broken leg suffered by Cascel Turner in the 1987 Junior Championship.

When it comes to the toughness of some players in dealing with injury Sue Reaburn (goalkeeper 74–75–77) takes some beating. One week prior to the Championship she received a depressed fracture of the cheekbone in a training match. The stitches from the injury came out two days before the first championship game. Sue was not going to let such a little thing stop her from competing so she purchased a bike-riders' padded helmet which she wore back to front so the side flaps provided some slight protection for the injured cheek.

Needless to say the Queenslanders put up a wall of silence about her injury and the opposition thought she was merely protecting a black eye. To add to her problems, she suffered a bout of tonsillitis throughout the week but still took the field in all matches bar one. A fitting reward for her fortitude and skill came when she was named the Championship's Best and Fairest Goalie.

Sponsorships were always hard to obtain and were usually only available through the personal representations of an official or parent. Two of the earliest were Wormald Security (tracksuits one year, donation in another) and Hestia who provided sports bras for quite a few years.

Although sponsored gear is always appreciated there have occasionally been some grand mix-ups usually caused by last minute deliveries. One State Junior Team discovered on the eve of departure that most of their tracksuits were way too large. A 7am fitting session at the airport courtesy of Graham Beale (Bill Browns) who arrived with spare tracksuits from a boy's team solved the problem.

Dress requirements have changed quite a bit from the days when players were required to provide their own shorts. In the 1970s the suggested evening wear was 'long skirt, long frock etc'. What an uproar this would create with today's players who sometimes have to be pressured into 'smart casual – no joggers'.

The first country players to make their appearance in the State Team were Pam Reynolds and Aloha Richards from Rockhampton in 1977. The following year they were joined by Karen Davies (M'boro) and Velvet Pitman (Pt.C) and now every team has its quota of country players – sometimes more than half.

In 1981 the AWSA set up an 'East Coast Competition' for U/15 players which was the forerunner to a National Junior Championship. Queensland lost both the 1981 and 1982 events to NSW on goal difference.

By 1983 however, there were six States prepared to enter teams in this division so the inaugural National U/15 (Junior) Championship was staged in Canberra. The event was scheduled for July rather than September to utilise school holidays and so minimise time lost by players.

Participation in the younger age groups had increased to such an extent by 1985 that a National U/17 (Youth) Championship was introduced.

The Junior and Youth Championships have been staged jointly at the one venue in some years but where there were problems with the availability of sufficient fields etc the two events were split.

These divisions have sometimes been decentralised to encourage growth/participation in country areas. While the concept was a valid one, it did have drawbacks in that it was impossible to offer players 'spare time' activities and difficult to provide adequate medical assistance related specifically to sports injuries. It must be said though that these destinations have proved popular with players and usually had the desired effect.

From 1979 when coach Wayne Offer opted to select a team of very young players, QLD adopted a policy of "if a player is good enough they are old enough".

By the end of the 1995 season Queensland had gained seven places in the Olympic Squad and three in the Train-on Squad. These figures equated to providing 26% of the Olympic squad from only 13% of total registrations.

This achievement was seen as both the reward and the justification for WSQ's commitment to the sometimes controversial areas of selecting younger players, of maintaining firm control over player discipline and of endeavouring to minimise player burnout by restricting junior/youth players to a choice between one or the other of National or Schoolgirl Championships.

Reigning champion NSW and VIC (who had led for a fair part of the nine day competition) faltered at crucial moments, but the Queenslanders made no such mistakes and with five wins and three draws finished as the only unbeaten team.

An entry from Mt. Isa was received after the closing date and had to be declined. They were so keen to attend that they arranged social matches against Kingsridge, Merton East and Dinmore while being billetted by the Kingsridge Club. However, a late withdrawal by Bundaberg enabled Mt. Isa to compete in the Championship.

Whilst the whole weekend involved heavy workloads for the officials concerned, it was a very satisfactory one. One problem discovered on the Friday was that billets had not been arranged for the Toowoomba players.

After a very hectic day in making sure each team had arrived safely and obtaining 13 billets at short notice, Elaine Watson was driving home at 10pm for a well earned rest when she accidentally ran a red light on Ipswich Road. Thankfully there was no traffic around but two intersections later a motorcycle policeman appeared.

Thinking it the perfect end for a not-so-perfect day, Elaine tendered her licence as he loomed alongside and said, "guilty as charged". At this the policeman became very sympathetic and altered the ticket to a lesser offence. When Elaine's young daughter discovered the ticket in the glove box and asked what was the difference between disobeying a traffic signal and failure to stop (or something like that) she was told, "\$20 and if you tell your father I'll spiflicate you"!

On the Sunday night, a BBQ and Regional Conference was held at the home of Patroness, Mrs Patsy Brusasco, where discussions took place regarding the success or otherwise of the format for the State Championship.

Teams from Brisbane North, Brisbane South, Gold Coast, Mackay, Maryborough, Mt. Isa, Pt. Curtis, Rockhampton, Sunshine Coast and Toowoomba took part in the inaugural State Championship.

Brisbane North defeated Brisbane South 1–0 in the Final. Mackay defeated Pt. Curtis 2–0 for the minor positions.

An early experiment in decentralisation was not an unqualified success. Officials and players were dismayed to find some rules altered or disregarded. This made it obvious that future events must be played in centres under the jurisdiction of SQWSA so that adequate control could be exercised.

District Associations were required to pay an affiliation fee of \$20. Teams not under SQWSA jurisdiction had to pay a \$20 nomination fee as a method of equalisation. New districts were encouraged to compete in the State Championship but were not compelled to affiliate. However, if they wished to compete a second time they then had to affiliate.

In 1984 a QLD Junior team took out the bye as no other centre could field a strong enough second team. The problems caused by the need to have an even number of entries was solved by the adoption of the random pools system operating successfully in National Championships.

A Trophy for the best and fairest player of the Titles was donated by the Sunshine Plantation/Big Pineapple and became a Championship feature until expansion into three divisions made selection of a recipient too difficult.

Various methods of dividing the Brisbane entries had been used to even out the competition. Firstly, there was Brisbane North and Brisbane South, then Open and Young Brisbane, then came 'Area of Origin'

when it was discovered that all 18 State players were playing with Brisbane clubs to take advantage of the better competition.

This meant that not only had District teams lost their best players but also that two State players would miss out on their chance for the State team because 16 was the limit for State championships and 18 for the Nationals and players had to compete in the State Titles to be eligible for the State team.

'Area of Origin' rules provided the answer to this problem as players were able to represent their districts at State championships while playing in the Brisbane domestic competition. As the standard of local play improved most of these players returned to their 'home base' and this requirement was dropped.

The next approach was to select on the basis of Brisbane and Ipswich. When a decline in player strength in Ipswich saw a change to Brisbane Bayside and Brisbane Moreton the decision did not sit well with the very parochial Ipswich supporters and provided a rallying point for the Moreton team of the day.

The wheel has now turned full circle and teams are now chosen on the basis of Brisbane North and Brisbane South. By 1987 player strength had reached the stage where an U/18 (or Junior) division was introduced. The age qualification was reduced to U/15 in 1991 and the following year three divisions were set as Open, Youth (U/19) and Juniors (U/16).

By 1995 there were 11 Open, 7 Youth and 6 Junior teams competing in the State Titles – truly a great leap forward from the initial 10 teams in 1978.

INTERNATIONAL EVENTS

The first International (Women's) Match in the State was held at Perry Park in 1979. Two games between Australia and New Zealand for the Umbro Cup had already been played in Sydney with NZ winning the first and the second being drawn. In the Queensland game Australia defeated New Zealand to tie the series. Queensland members of the Team were Sue Monteath and Elaine Watson (Manager). The Umbro Cup later became the Trans-Tasman Cup.

This series was very hard fought and the New Zealand Manager was hardly an example of sporting goodwill when she responded to the congratulations of the Australian Manager by grinding out, "You won't get the Cup you know!" – and Australia didn't until the 1980 series which they won convincingly.

1987 saw a week of friendship games between the visiting San Bruno combined colleges team and various Queensland teams – Broadbeach, University of Qld and the State Team.

Queensland hosted its second international event in 1989 with the successful staging of the 3rd Oceania Cup competition. As the final acceptors for this event (Australia, Chinese-Taipai, India, New Zealand and Papua New Guinea) totalled an uneven number it was decided to enter a second Australian Team to take out the bye.

Unfortunately for these well-intentioned plans, India did not turn up. The competition was a

huge success both in the quality of games and the standard of organisation.

Enthusiastic spectators turned out in droves for the final between New Zealand and Chinese Taipei which was played in absolutely atrocious conditions with the field being covered by inches of water. The smaller Chinese Taipei players coped with this handicap better than the more physical New Zealanders to eventually run out the winners 1–0. Michelle Sawyers was awarded Player of the Team for Australia Gold.

WATSON SHIELD

To facilitate the selection of the Queensland team for the 1975 National Championship it was proposed to stage a Carnival during the Easter Weekend with invitations to country teams in Bundaberg, Lismore, Maryborough and Rockhampton.

Staged on Monday, 31st March at Carina this event became the first WATSON SHIELD CARNIVAL making it the longest established statewide competition. Competing teams were Annerley, Bankstown (NSW), Bardon Latrobe, Coalstars, Merton-East, Redcliffe, Redlands and University.

The carnival atmosphere of the day was boosted by fund-raising stalls selling Sweets, Cakes, Fruit and Fancy Goods and there were seafood and poultry raffles throughout the day. Inaugural winners were Annerley 2–0 over Bankstown.

Because of the enthusiasm for the concept, it was decided to provide a supplementary competition for those teams which lost in the quarter-finals and the Consolation Cup (also donated by Elaine Watson) came into being. In following years the Cup would be played for by first round losers.

The Watson Shield Rules provided for a seeded draw to ensure the quality of the final and that where possible two country teams were not matched in the first round thereby giving all country teams the chance to progress through to the final.

Later amendments provided for a maximum of 16 teams with country teams being given priority for 8 places and imposed a restriction on Clubs of only one entry if more than 16 teams nominated.

The five Country Centres which had affiliated with the SQWSA all entered teams in 1977 – Bundaberg, Maryborough, Pt. Curtis (Gladstone), Rockhampton and Toowoomba as did Lismore (NSW) with Pt. Curtis being a late withdrawal.

Three of the Rockhampton players (Kim Ireland, Pam Reynolds and Aloha Richards) were selected for further training and trials for the State Team. Kim later withdrew due to her commitment to the State Hockey Team.

An incident in 1978 brought the fledgling SQWSA face to face with the fairly prevalent attitude of the day that a women's statewide competition could not be thought to equal a QSF fixture.

The carnival had been scheduled for Heath Park (Merton East Soccer Club). On the Thursday SQWSA were advised that due to heavy rain during the week Easts would not allow their field to be used because they had to be in tip-top condition for the senior men's game on Saturday night. Fortunately, Oxley Soccer Club had no such reservations and the Carnival was transferred there at the last moment.

An entry fee of \$10 was introduced in 1980. This was eventually increased to \$50 to cover the referees' fees.

During the latter part of the 80s and early 90s interest in this Carnival waned as many country players preferred to save their cash for the State Championships which carried more prestige. Participation was then made compulsory for all 1st Division teams with quite a few lower division teams anxious to take up the vacant slots to test themselves against top competition.

With the implementation of the Premier League competition Brisbane teams have given every indication of renewed enthusiasm for the Watson Shield. This interest has been mirrored in country areas which should make for a very keenly contested weekend next season.

As can be seen from the statistics, by far the most dominant team has been Eastern Suburbs with nine wins. Only one country team (Gold Coast) has succeeded in winning the Watson Shield.

Country teams have had more success in the Consolation Cup where three of them have racked up five wins between them.

Occupation: CLERICAL


Donna has probably been the most dominant country player over the past 20 years.

Sonia was made a 'scholarship coach' with the QAS and is involved in the ITC program with younger elite players.

SUE CLAYTON

Occupation: STOREPERSON

Sue has been an integral part of the Brisbane and Queensland Teams for many of the past 20 years. She has played for Brisbane at 15 State Championships and for Queensland at 13 National Championships.

She was named PLAYER OF THE YEAR in 1993 amidst popular acclaim.

Sue has taken part in 2 international tours and is always willing to lend her experience to the training of goalkeepers. She holds a Level II Coaching Certificate and coached the Brisbane South Juniors in the 1996 State championships as well as junior boy's teams at Capalaba.

AFFILIATES

BRISBANE

In the years from 1965 to 1974 the women's competition was conducted by the Brisbane Junior Soccer Association. When SQWSA was first formed the Brisbane competition was a large part of the Association's activities. From 1975 team numbers increased from 8 until there were 27 competing in 1981.

For the next ten years numbers remained relatively static but from then on there was steady growth which saw 54 teams competing in 1996. Indications are that in 1997 there will be in excess of ninety teams – quite a significant increase.

The administration of a growing competition based on Brisbane and the later inclusion of an expanding State Championship brought about many demands on resources both in personnel and in finance.

Finance of course is an ongoing problem, but some difficulties facing administrative personnel were solved by the introduction of manuals setting out the specific responsibilities of each Executive position which were compiled and presented by Elaine Watson. By having current officials amend and/or update these manuals throughout the year incoming officials were saved from 're-inventing the wheel'.

In the fixture competition, the open divisions were first designated alphabetically but this was changed to numerical in line with the QSF. If there were sufficient teams, then a Junior or Age competition was provided. When numbers were few these junior players were encouraged to enter one of the lower open divisions.

Whilst most women's teams were formed within established clubs, there have been several instances of independent teams registering with SQWSA. The first of these was 'MIXTURES' (several risque alternative names having been rejected by the Executive) who entered the 3rd Division in 1977. Others were MILTON DODGERS and then SOCCERETTES (coached by Carl Fenech) who were a successful junior team before merging with Ipswich City.

In 1988 the Yowyeh family, long time players and supporters of soccer for women, formed a team of predominently aboriginal players who entered the competition under the banner of TIWIWARRIN.

Archival records show how earnestly the administrators of the day took their responsibilities when they had to use great diplomacy to defuse the angry confrontations caused by the following chain letter and its method of circulation. The original sting has long been forgotten and left only the humour behind.

"This chain letter was started by a man who hoped it would bring ease and happiness to tired businessmen. Contrary to most other chain letters, this doesn't cost any money.

Simply send a copy of this letter to one of your friends who is as tired as you are, send your wife in the quickest possible way to the name at the top of the list and put your name at the bottom of the list.

When your name reaches the top you will receive 5869 women and surely quite a few goodies! Be trusting, do not break the chain. A man who broke the chain got his old wife back!

PS - One of my old friends received 46 women the other day. He was buried yesterday and all say that he had a smile on his face for the first time in many years."

Just shows that historical research has its lighter moments!

With the aim of improving the standard in open divisions and providing maximum opportunities for junior players, various fixture formats to cater for different circumstances evolved over the seasons.

Early in proceedings, Clubs were restricted to only one team in the 1st Div. This was aimed at encouraging clubs to select their best players for their top team so as to promote the progression of good players through the levels of competition rather than fielding two teams of equal but lesser standard.

In 1980 the 1st Division was reduced to 6 teams. At the end of the season, the benefits of this move were still being argued. It was seen that the weakest team in 1st Div. lost morale from the constant large defeats while teams in 2nd Division were fighting an uphill battle all season against the two teams who would have been promoted under the previous system.

One solution applied to strengthen Div. 1 was the inclusion of representative teams from Gold Coast, Sunshine Coast and Toowoomba which had the added benefit of providing wider experience for the district teams.

Another was to enter the State Youth and State Junior squads into the 1st and 2nd Divs respectively which match-hardened both these squads for the Nationals.

The mass defection of whole teams (usually of the better players) from one club to another between seasons was found to adversely affect quite a few Club development programs as well as throwing into havoc the promotion and relegation system. By introducing a ruling that new teams had to commence in the lowest division this practice was largely eliminated.

Twelve years ago an attempt was made to introduce a reserve competition for the 1st Div. The main purpose behind this move was to upgrade the top competition by eliminating byes and under-strength teams. It was also envisaged that the restructuring would widen the number of players experiencing the best competition available and have the flow-on effect of increasing the number of players to come to the attention of the State Coaches.

The original aim was for 8 clubs to take advantage of the proposed 1st Division/Reserve scenario but this was later reduced to a minimum of 6 clubs. Unfortunately for the proposal there were insufficient clubs able to muster the required support and the restructuring lapsed.

An alternative proposal was to remove the restriction on players playing only 4 games in a higher division before being regraded to that division. This was amended to a requirement that 1st division teams had to register a minimum of 11 players (later amended to 7) with the remainder being allowed to play 'up' an unlimited number of times. This was the eventual formula adopted.

Some eleven years later, a working party of Brisbane officials operating under guidelines proposed by President Lyn Ketter finalised a re-vamp of the Brisbane competition. The original suggestion had been for a Premier Division with a Reserve Division restricted to Youth players.

The final structure provided for an 8-team Premier Division with the criteria for admission to this league being that each accepted club would have to guarantee to field a team which contained a minimum of seven youth players in their Reserve Division.

Brisbane has actively supported the need for professional accreditation of team coaches at all levels. It was hoped that by the end of 1995 all club coaches would hold at least Level I accreditation.

There have also been "Come and Try" Days conducted at Geebung aimed at encouraging female primary school students to learn about soccer. By the end of 1995 it was hoped that club coaches of women's teams would all hold at least Level I coaching accreditation.

Brisbane teams have competed with a high degree of success at the State Championships. Various boundaries have been imposed within the Brisbane membership with the aim of providing teams which were competitive but did not completely dominate the Championship.

There have been Brisbane Open and Brisbane Youth, Brisbane South and Brisbane North, Brisbane and Ipswich, Brisbane Bayside and Brisbane Moreton, 'Area of Origin' and then back again to the present Brisbane South and Brisbane North.

At the second championship Lyn Ketter (Coach), Jan Monteath (physio) and Elaine Watson (Manager) were highly amused to find that the players in Young Brisbane thought ALL the teams were their age as they didn't realise it was an Open competition. Just shows it's not the age that counts but the skill level.

The Brisbane Open team termed themselves the 'hags' and the young Brisbane team the 'kiddies'. The warcry after Brisbane Open won the Title was "Hags we are, hags we'll be, In 1980 we'll make it three".

Extracts from Lyn Ketter's report to the AGM are very revealing as to the difficulties and successes achieved in her first year as coach.

"Set out to visit Clubs in March with the intention of selecting the youngest players possible U/16 who showed the greatest aptitude and natural ability soon found there were not enough players in this category so extended the upper age to U/18 squad of 20 chosen from 40 nominees and reduced to the final 15 players for the State Titles very pleased and proud of their performance they played football and won the hearts of the crowds performance great and overall team spirit was incredible considering the oldest player was 18 and the youngest 12 won their first three games unlucky to lose the semi-final to Brisbane Open seven selected in the Queensland squad now working towards the game against Sydney U/14s."

From 1987 through to 1991 Brisbane Youth competed in the Open Division. When an Under Age Championship was introduced, Brisbane Juniors competed in this division regardless of the older age limit. Since 1992 Brisbane Youth and Junior teams have competed in the appropriate divisions.

During the fixture season, teams compete for several awards apart from Premiers, Champions and Most Improved.

WATSON SHIELD AND CONSOLATION CUP

Donated by Elaine Watson in 1975 and 1976. As these trophies are open to statewide competition they have been covered in a separate chapter earlier in this publication.

PRESIDENT'S TROPHY

Originally awarded for best goal average but changed the following year to best goal difference and then restricted to 1st and 2nd Div teams in 1980. With the introduction of Player of the Year for these divisions in 1983, this Trophy was re-allocated to 3rd and 4th Divs.

After 18 years of joint administration an independent committee to conduct the affairs of the Brisbane Division of Women's Soccer Queensland was formed as the culmination of two years planning. This move had the effect of separating the Brisbane competition from the statewide activities of the parent body.

PLAYER OF THE YEAR

In 1982 Ian Brusasco (QSF President) placed a proposal before the SQWSA Committee for him to sponsor a trophy for a 'Player of the Year' in line with the Rothman's Gold Medal then operating for the QSF.

It was intended that this award would be an upmarket presentation which would enable women's soccer in Brisbane to show-case the talents of their top players.

Initally the award was open to players in 1st and 2nd Divisions, but in 1989 it was restricted to the 1st Div.

Coaches were required to nominate 12 players from outside their team, each team voted for their own

their 'player's player' and Executive awarded points for 'contribution to the game' (via administration, coaching etc.) Scores were collated and the top twelve nominees received a trophy with the highest scorer being named PLAYER OF THE YEAR.

An incentive for lower division players was later provided through introduction the divisional awards. The voting system here required coaches to nominate players from each opposing team. Again each team voted for their own 'player's player'. The two highest scorers in each division would be named on the final night, one of whom would receive a special award.

In 1996 the selection methods were once again modified. Only Premier League players are eligible for Player of the Year and each Premier League Coach awards points on a 3–2–1 basis to opposition players. Each team nominates their 'Player's Player' and the administration awards points to a maximum of 3 for 'Contribution'.

Should there be any equality of score then the players' coaches will be asked to award points for 'Attitude' to a maximum of 3.

In all other divisions there will be two 'Most Consistent Players'. Coaches will nominate a player from the opposing team after each fixture and the points tallied at the end of the fixture season. The 'Player's Player' will be decided by each team and these nominations also lodged at the end of the fixture season.

Recipients must be in attendance at the function unless there is an acceptable reason for nonattendance and any player receiving a red card during the season will also be ineligible for any of these awards.

From the inaugural recipient (Leanne Priestley) onwards the list of winners reads like a who's who of women's soccer. It is interesting to note that only one player, Joanne Millman, has received double honours. Eastern Suburbs and Coalstars have each provided four winners.

Gold Coast has hosted State Championships in 1982, 1987 and 1992 and has won the Youth Title in 1989 and 1993 and the Junior Title in 1993.

This area has been one of the most consistent of the country entries in the Watson Shield and Consolation Cup, winning the Shield in 1987 and 1991 and the Cup in 1985.

For many years the end of season carnival at Hunt Park was a highlight of the women's soccer calendar. This was very much a relaxed event which sometimes attracted as many as 32 teams who came from as far afield as Pt. Curtis, Toowoomba, Lismore, Newcastle, Sydney, and Bundaberg.

Whilst Mackay only became officially affiliated with WSQ in 1992, two of their players had already been prominent in the Queensland Open Team – Donna Fredrickson and Tammy Jansen (Eiby). This was made possible by their transfer at the end of their domestic competition to Brisbane clubs which ratified their selection in the State Team.

By far the most prominent figure in the continuing progress of Mackay has been Donna Fredrickson. Not only has she represented the State for ten years, but she also represented Australia on the 1991 tour of New Zealand.

In addition to this, Donna has turned her talents to coaching, more particularly of the juniors. She is a

super-fit player and even the births of her two children have not been able to slow down her hectic schedule. Not only did she complete a 5km walk hours before her first child was born but her second was born at Maryborough on the way to Brisbane for a holiday two weeks before the Championships. This early arrival meant Donna could then turn out for the Mackay Open as well as coach the Mackay Juniors.

The 1980 State Championship was hosted by Mt. Isa but the cost proved a major barrier for most other districts. This shows how dedicated the Mt. Isa players are to have competed in as many Championships as they have.

Throughout the 1980s the Mt. Isa Girl's Association struggled to maintain interest in their area. In 1992 Mt. Isa affiliated with WSQ and the following year again entered the State Championship.

The present Association has been very active in participating in as many events as their isolated geographic position allows. Mt. Isa teams have played in the NT Championship in Darwin and in an Intercity Challenge between NW Region and NT. Mt. Isa has also hosted women's soccer for the Suncorp NQ games.

A very progressive move saw the Association fund two members for their Level 1 Sports Medicine Certificate.

Pat Jackson applied for a copy of the SQWSA Constitution in 1985 but, as mentioned above, the lack of volunteer administrators saw the women's division come under the control of the North Queensland (men's) Association.

Of recent years, Karen Clifford has been most prominent in dedicating her time and efforts to ensuring that the amalgamation of the men and women under the banner of North Queensland Soccer Federation proceeded smoothly and that the women's concerns were not overlooked.

Karen was a member of the Women in Sport Task Force in 1992 and guided women's soccer through competition in the Burdekin 1000 and the Suncorp NQ Games. As well as participating in local fixtures, clubs play in carnivals in Ayr and Cairns.

Following the formation of WSQ, NQ affiliated in 1992 and the following year a very successful Girls in Soccer Week was conducted with displays at 20

schools, coaching clinics and promotional work on TV, radio and the print media. The clinics were estimated to have reached 2000 girls in the 5–17 age group.

The 1996 State Championships were played in Townsville where the venue and organisation certainly showed what the North Queenslanders were capable of.

ROCKHAMPTON

When this district first affiliated with SQWSA in 1976 it was under the name of Rockhampton and Districts Women's Soccer Association. The Women's Association became amalgamated with the Men and in 1993 this name was changed to Central Queensland Soccer Federation and then back again to Rockhampton & Districts Soccer Federation in 1996.

Player strength in 1976 was 150 and the local competition now supports 10 open teams while two female coaches have been running a six-a-side competition for Junior and High School girls which should provide many more players over the next few years.

The first country players to play in a Queensland State Team came from Rockhampton when Pam Reynolds and Aloha Richards were chosen i 77.

Teams representing Rockhampton have participated in the Watson Shield for quite a number of years and have won the Consolation Cup in 1977 and 1978.

Although there have been quite a few ups and downs in the progress of the code, probably the most contentious was in 1988 when a dispute arose over the participation of Tammy Sprott in the (Men's) Youth competition. In general country areas find it is very much a case of 'every player counts' and perhaps the real problem here was Tammy's undoubted skills. Eventually agreement was reached and Tammy was allowed to participate.

State Championships have been staged very successfully in 1979 and 1993 with quite a few players chosen at all three levels of State representation.

Currently all women's games are played at 4.30pm on Saturdays between men's games which has helped to bring our section of the code to the notice of all soccer supporters and the media.

SUNSHINE COAST

The Sunshine Coast Soccer Federation holds the distinction of being the first District to administer all three sectors of soccer - men, women and juniors.

Prior to affiliation in 1978 registrations numbered 90 - a figure which later grew to 180. In fact between 1995 and 1996 there was a 43% increase and the competition supported 8 open and 6 junior teams.

In the late 70s and early 80s Maroochydore conducted a well-supported carnival which attracted quite a few Brisbane teams.

Sunshine Coast has hosted State Championships in 1984 and 1989 and scored a win in the 1987 Youth Championship.

Because of proximity to Brisbane, Sunshine Coast has participated in the Watson Shield Carnival (winning the Consolation Cup in 1982 and 1992) and has also occasionally fielded a team in the Brisbane 1st Division.

In the 90s progress in many areas has been quite remarkable. There have been regular features in local papers and the Sunday morning sports show on TV. Anissa Tann (at that time Captain of Australia) conducted coaching clinics which were well received.

Sunshine Coast has a part-time DOC working with both females and males. This has resulted in quite a number of girls participating in roo-ball teams as well as the U/11 and U/12 boy's competitions. The Junior (girls) Division games are played on Friday nights.

WIDE BAY

Wide Bay Women's Soccer Council covers Associations in Bundaberg, Gympie, Maryborough and South Burnett. The Council officially came into being on 19th November, 1995 after a preliminary meeting under the auspices of the WSQ Development Plan.

This project was designed to assist the member districts of the region to field competitive representative teams and to establish an overall administrative team which would have the responsibility of organising inter-city games and participation in the State Championships.

Zone trials are held in Bundaberg with the Bundaberg Soccer Federation contributing gate takings and canteen profits to the WBWSC.

As with any fledgling organisation there have been some teething problems but the Council has now established guidelines for coaches, managers and players in addition to legal requirements such as a Constitution.

The Council now enters teams in each of the three divisions of the State Championships. Total registrations reached 317 in 1996 and the move to Zone Teams resulted in the success of the Wide Bay Juniors who became State Champions in their inaugural season.
